THINGS TO DO AT MAPLEWOOD STATE PARK

HIKING: 25 miles of hiking trails.

Favorite hikes:

- a. Hallaway Hill -this 1 mile hike is all uphill for ½ mile but the view from the top is wonderful.
- b. Woodland Trail ³/₄ mile
- c. Cataract Lake Trail 1 mile
- d. Grass Lake Trail Interpretive Trail 1.2 miles Interpretive signs
- **GPS:** Check out a GPS at the Ranger Station and go find the 2 geocaches in Maplewood State Park. It is a fun and gives you a chance to explore the woods of Maplewood. The Park Office will give you a few pointers as to how to use the GPS. No charge.

Canoe: We have 4 on Beers Lake, 2 on Grass Lake, 1 on Bass Lake

Kayak: 2 single person kayaks and 1 tandem kayak on Beers Lake

Boats: 5 on Beers Lake, 3 on Bass Lake, 2 on Grass Lake



[Canoe, kayak, or boat rentals: \$15.00 for ¹/₂ day (5 hours or less) \$25.00 for all day lifejackets included in price]

Fishing: Remember Minnesota residents can fish without a license in Maplewood State Park on the following lakes: Beers, Grass, Twenty-one, and Cow. Bass Lake requires a Minnesota fishing license & trout stamp. Park Also has fishing poles to check out, no charge.

Horse Trails: 20 miles

Wildlife viewing: Wildlife viewing blind on Beaver Lake. Drive or bike the scenic park drive to view wildlife!

Swimming: South Lake Lida No Lifeguard

Picnic area: South Lake Lida Josh Hanson Memorial Picnic Shelter

PASSPORT CLUB: Purchase kit at Park Office. Each time you visit a different State Park you get a stamp. When you have visited so many different State Parks, you can earn patches and free night of camping.

HIKING CLUB: Purchase kit at Park office. Each time you hike a different hiking club trail in a Minnesota State Park you record our mileage and password in the provided book. You can earn patches, free night of camping for various miles hiked. The hiking club trail at Maplewood is a little over six miles. Ask at park office for details.

JUNIOR PARK NATURLIST: Ages 7 –14 free books at Park Office. Book has activities to do at the State Park

Kids Discovery Kits: Kits feature activities, stories and tips to help ensure your visit will be fun and memorable. Check out free of charge one of the discovery kits at the park office: Camping Skills, Around the Campfire, or Wildlife by Water.

Birding Kits: Check out free of charge a birding kit at the park office. The birding kit comes with binoculars, a guide book and bird lists for Maplewood State Park.

Campfire Pie Makers: Check out free of charge campfire pie makers at the park office.

Kevin graduated from the University of Minnesota in



1983 with a degree in Forestry. In March of 1989 he applied for a job at Maplewood. For 25 years Kevin has held the position of Buildings and Grounds supervisor at Maplewood State Park. The position is seasonal

and he works 6 ¹/₂ months from mid-April until the end of October. He calls it the best job he has ever had and in talking with him one realizes how much he cares for Maplewood State Park.

At times when you visit Maplewood you will see Kevin almost every time you turn around because he is involved in all aspects of caring for the park. Other times you visit you might never see him, but when you think about the 9000 acres that he cares for it is understandable.

Most mornings they meet at 8:30 to discuss the day's activities and what needs to be done. The fact that everyone who works at the park is not afraid to get out and get dirty makes the group a big happy family and a fun work environment. Kevin appreciates the summer helpers, especially when they return year after year, so he doesn't have to spend a lot of time training them. His favorite job would be operating a chain saw. The enjoyment of felling a tree and cutting it up is something he could do all day. He also enjoys cleaning the buildings and then later finding a comment card that says "clean bathrooms, we'll be back". Opening and closing buildings, road maintenance, and 40 miles of trails to maintain are other responsibilities. Having to spend time in the office would be on his list of least favorite jobs. All I know is that there is a lot of knowledge about what needs to be done in Maplewood recorded in Kevin's head and he'll be a tough person to have to replace some day.

Getting to visit with campers when he is on night security work is fun. Those campers really are good

people. Kevin stated, "They make the park look good because most of them are responsible and clean up after themselves in the bathroom and fish cleaning areas." Watching the little kids in the park having fun is a great joy. On night security he refers to the loud noise of the kids as "going to bed noise".

When they put in that Little Library, Kevin thought it wouldn't last long. "I am amazed at how many people use it. It is such a great addition to Maplewood," Kevin stated. One day he found a little girl sitting behind the library reading. Striking up a conversation he discovered she had been fishing all morning with her dad, told him she was tired of that, and was going to go spend some time reading. He stops often to read the comments left in the notebook in the little library.

This spring they couldn't get water to come out of the spigot in the fish cleaning house. The sprayers worked, but not the spigot. It was a head scratcher. They finally took the top off the spigot, but still no water. Using his finger he could push down on the hole and it was spongy. Finally water shot out of the hole and the mouse fell out of the nozzle. Problems like this make his job interesting and sometimes full of humor.

As he looks back over his 25 years, he just marvels at all the improvements at Maplewood. It has come a long way, but there is still room for more. His #1 choice would be an improved and larger shower building at the main campground.

When you're in Maplewood and in need of a good conversation, go find Kevin. He enjoys talking about the park and you will soon learn that this is a big job, but he truly enjoys Maplewood State Park and taking care of it. During your conversation maybe you can help him figure out how to get that load of gravel up to the top of Hallaway Hill. Thanks Kevin for all that you do.
