We watched and listened to a presentation on the progress of the Perham to Pelican Rapids Regional Trail which will pass through Maplewood. Chuck Carpenter from the DNR talked about the long term strategic plan. Next project in the future for Maplewood from the State will be a new shower building at the Grass Lake Campground.

For the past 2 or 3 years we have been having a discussion about whether to use something to block the wind and rain at the picnic shelter. Three different plans have been put forward and after a short discussion a written ballot vote was taken and the option of doing nothing was the decision.

Decision was also made to continue Music at Maplewood during the summer and the Friends of Maplewood Photo Contest. Thanks to all who took the time to attend our annual meeting. It was a good meeting.

LIFETIME MEMBER [A Story]

Who becomes a Lifetime Member of the Friends of Maplewood? What makes a person decide to become a Lifetime Member? Just so you know the Friends of Maplewood is thankful for all of our members. Most of our members join continuously year after year sending in their dues. Thank you all so much.

But one day in the mail I was opening more membership letters with people paying their dues and I came to one who was a first time joiner and she joined with a Lifetime Membership. And Mary is from Ames, Iowa. I was curious about what connection she had to Maplewood so I gave her a call.

She told me it is a long story and she didn't lie. Her grandfather farmed in Iowa, but came to Minnesota once in a while. So one summer her dad spent the summer in Fergus Falls and worked as a soda jerk at a drug store. He enjoyed his summer in Otter Tail County. After some time living in California, he returned to operate the family farm in Iowa, but he told his family they would get one week up in Minnesota on a lake each year before school started. When he visited here he liked to fish and relax on a quiet lake. They visited different resorts, but did spend a few summers at the Shady Rest Resort on Beers Lake. It was very quiet and peaceful on that lake. In the early 60's, Mary was in 8th grade, and she recalls one week when their cousins were visiting from California. They referred to the island on Beers Lake as Paradise Island. One day they made a time capsule out of a wooden silverware drawer, filled it with special items, took it to Paradise Island and buried it. She assumes it is probably rotted out by now.

Mary (whose maiden name is Kohler) eventually ended up with a cabin on Long Lake, north of Otter Tail, so she comes here quite often now. All visitors to her cabin come to Maplewood to hike Hallaway Hill. So September 29th found Mary and her sister at Leaf Days on the wagon ride asking Bob Hanson many questions. They just love Maplewood and later she picked up a newsletter and membership application and the rest is history. Thank you Mary for your Lifetime Membership and the fun story.

Shady Rest Resort

Did you know there was a resort on Beers Lake? I had never heard that and Mary said that they drove the minimum maintenance road looking for some remnants of a road down to the lake. Couldn't find any, but they knew it wasn't that far from Fladmark Lake. Next day they visited the museum in Fergus Falls, and looked for information about the Shady Rest Resort. They did find an obituary for Lloyd Cromwell that said he had operated resorts on Beers Lake and West Silent Lake. Seems when they closed the resort on Beers Lake they moved the cabins to West Silent and operated the Shady Rest Resort there. His wife, Elaine Cromwell, was a speech pathologist and maybe taught in Pelican Rapids. This was around the early 1960s. By 1968 the plot map shows that the property belonged to Maplewood State Park.

2019 Deer Hunting at Maplewood State Park

Nearly 100 deer hunters participated in the 2019 special deer hunt at Maplewood. The 4-day deer hunt (November 9th -12th) was a good, safe, and wonderful experience for hunters, young and old alike. The 2019 season greeted hunters with nice weather and a little snow on Sunday of the hunt. To manage the deer herd within the park, a special deer hunt has been held each year since the early 1980's. The purpose of the hunt is to protect native plant diversity and restoration efforts from over-browsing by deer.

Hunters who desire to participate in the park hunt need to apply through the DNR Electronic Licensing System (ELS) in early September. The DNR ELS system issues licenses through 1,500 license agent locations throughout Minnesota or via the DNR Web site at mndnr.gov or via a toll free telephone number (1-888-665-4236). The DNR License Bureau notifies the 100 successful applicants by early October and specific hunt information is sent to each successful applicant. Approximately 380 hunters applied for the 100 available licenses. Unsuccessful applicants will gain a preference point for the next year's lottery. The more preference points a hunter has the better chance at getting drawn. (Successful hunters usually have three or four preference points.

For the 2019 season, each hunter had the opportunity to purchase a bonus tag, along with their regular deer license, to use during the park hunt. The bonus tag enabled each hunter to harvest an additional antlerless deer. A total of 61 deer were harvested during the 2019 Special Deer Hunt.

Cliff Knutson – Deer Hunter

Cliff Knutson is a valued member of the Friends of Maplewood Advisory Board and a resident of Fergus Falls. When members of a hunting party headed by Minnesota Gov. Tim Walz came to the Fergus Falls area for opening of deer hunting, Cliff stepped forward to help as a hunter host for Tom Claycomb and Bob Johnson. With Knutson's help, both men tagged deer. Claycomb had a trophy buck within an hour. Knutson took Johnson up to Maplewood later on Saturday where he also shot a buck.

Knutson, who was lauded by Walz Friday morning at the 17th annual Minnesota Governor's Deer Hunting Opener, has hunted deer every season over the last 75 years. Guiding for two members of the governor's party was "very rewarding" according to Knutson. His own hunting excursion came after the opening weekend. He hunted on property he has adjacent to Maplewood State Park and he did get his deer. Congratulations Cliff as you got your deer during the same week you turned 85.

CANDLELIGHT SKI



SATURDAY, February 22nd 6:00-8:30

The last 2 years of our **Candlelight Ski** have been awesome. Come and enjoy the evening with us again in 2020. The 1 mile ski trail will be lighted with 150 candles. This evening, walkers, snowshoers, and skiers share the

trail. So if you don't ski, you can walk, snowshoe or stand around the campfire, chat with friends, and enjoy hot chili, smores, bars, and hot drinks. Maplewood State Park has 12 sets of snowshoes that you can try out. No skis are available.

We will have the chili on and ready to serve by 5:00. So come early to Maplewood State Park and ski some of the 8 miles of trails that afternoon. After an hour or so of skiing, come and join the Friends at the Trail Center for supper before going out on the candle lighted trail.

Remember, if you come to go skiing, you do need a Ski Pass if 16 or older. \$10.00 daily ski passes are available at the Park and a 1 year ski pass (\$25) can be purchased at most sport stores [Maplewood can sell them also]. Of course Minnesota Park Stickers are required on all vehicles. Questions can be answered at Maplewood State Park, 218-863-8383. If snow is questionable, call before you come or check our website.
